Silverware: knives, forks, spoons – 4 each, 2 serving spoons Other: baking dish, small/medium size mixing bowl

• For anyone - extras: Bible, basic cookbook, clock radio, small table lamp

Come to Sunday School and Check Out Our Renovated Rooms!

A BIG thank you to everyone who pitched in to renovate the eight Sunday School rooms on the first floor of the Wesley Center. These rooms were vacated by the Wesley Center Day School at the end of May.

A team of church members got to work in June. We sorted childcare items, saving those our church could use in the future. Regional childcare facilities bought furniture and supplies, and we sent the rest to the Mountain Mission. *Many* thanks to Jana Sturm for leading this effort and to all those who helped with the first step toward restoring the first-floor rooms of the Wesley Center.

By mid-June, another team of dedicated church members began the hard work of cleaning, repairing and restoring each room. Carpets were cleaned. Walls, doors, cabinetry, furniture and windows were washed. Stickers, packing tape, staples, paint and blobs of hot glue were removed. Walls were patched and repainted. Ceiling tiles and grids that had been damaged with wall paint were painted with a stain killing paint.

In a companion project, repairs were made to the ceiling and ceiling tiles on the second floor.

This week, the vinyl floors in the whole building are being stripped and rewaxed. The entire first floor is fresh and clean and our Wesley Center is ready to meet the needs of our church.

The restoration effort was done lovingly by church members who donated both time and resources to accomplish it. Volunteers bought the paint and cleaners. They came and worked quietly every day for over a month to restore our beautiful building. Although there are a few last details to complete, the project is essentially complete, and we can all be proud to attend Sunday School in these rooms and welcome visitors to our church.

Thirty two paintings by Tona Barkley are now hanging in the Gallery of the Wesley Center. This is part of our ongoing mission to introduce the Frankfort/Franklin County community to local artists. The exhibit will be up through September.

About the artist in her own words:

I have always loved to draw and paint people, and I have always loved modernism, which distorted and mangled the human image and put it back together in crazy ways and with wild coloration. I fell in love with early modern painting way back in the Sixties, when I went to college in New York State and began spending every spare moment in New York City museums.

All my years of observing have fed my artwork, and my muse refuses to stay in one box. Each year, I do a few realistic, commissioned portraits (including the official portrait of Kentucky Supreme Court Justice Janet Stumbo, which hangs in the State Capitol), but I also play around with expressive ways of depicting figures. Because my husband and I play music, we and our musician friends loom large in my work, and we have used my paintings on two of our CD covers. Paintings also spring from photos of family members, on and off the beach, another favorite. I have used a folk art style in a few paintings, and lately I have begun exploring both landscape and abstraction.

My insatiable desire to learn leads me to keep exploring different techniques, art history and contemporary art, to know more and press forward in new ways. Painting, for me, is a process of discovery, and after a painting is done, it is hard to remember the steps, layers, experiments and micro-decisions that brought it to completion. Ultimately, it is a mystery, and that is what drives me to make more art.



Dear Church:

As I am sure most of you are aware, the front elevator has not been working for a number of weeks. The hydraulic line running from the elevator machine room, located in the basement, to the front elevator has sprung a leak. This requires the line to be replaced.

Since the leaking hydraulic line is located underground it creates two problems.

One, the existing line is difficult to remove and replace.

Two, our insurance company will not cover the cost of repair.

One of reasons it has taken so long is that we submitted a claim to our insurance company and as of last week the claim was rejected.

The cost of running a new hydraulic line from the machine room to the front elevator is \$28,400. The new line will be run above the first-floor ceiling.

The elevator needs to be working. As of now everyone with a need is using the rear elevator. This makes it difficult for people with disabilities to access the second floor.

Please note that this is not a budgeted expense. The Trustees have authorized this work because it is necessary and hopefully the work can proceed soon. Any support for this project would be greatly appreciated.
