Dear First Friends,

I am so grateful to be your pastor and to share alongside you in such a rich and wholistic ministry. Together we are pursuing our vision to glorify God, follow Jesus, serve others, and welcome everyone. If First United Methodist Church did not exist in Frankfort, its absence would be felt. But because of FUMC, people are growing in their love of God and neighbor. Faith is nurtured and people are served in tangible ways both near and far. I have reasons every day to give thanks for you.

I want to use this space to highlight an opportunity that is perhaps less familiar to some of you. Every Wednesday at 11:00am, we hold Prayer, Devotions, and Communion in the Rogers Chapel, just off the narthex (entry) into the sanctuary.

There is a small but faithful band of folks who attend regularly. I know they would love to welcome you.

Typically, we begin by going over the most recent prayer list and moving to a time of prayer. (Well, actually, we begin with a time of informal chit-chat, and then we go on to the prayer list...)

Next, we have a brief devotion. Recently we have begun to read the Letter to the Ephesians reflectively as our devotion. It's a bit of a different style than we are used to, but if all goes well, we will continue to read through from the beginning to the end. The Letter to the Ephesians has much to offer by reminding us of God's immeasurable grace toward us and how we live together in peace in light of that grace.

Then we share in Holy Communion, ending with the Lord's Prayer and saying together, "This is the day that the LORD has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it." (Psalm 118:24)

Recently, one of our regular attenders who has been recovering from surgery called just as we were ending our time together, and we were able to talk with her, encourage her, and pray with her.

I know that many of you are working or at school on Wednesdays at 11:00am. Perhaps you will remember those of us who are gathered in prayer and/or lift a prayer of your own during that time.

I hope that those of you who are available during that time will consider joining us. You won't be sorry you did. I always leave refreshed and renewed.

Again, I am grateful for all of you, for your daily faithfulness, and for your commitment to Christ particularly through the ministry and mission of First United Methodist Church. It is one of the best churches around, if you ask me, and there has never been a better time to endeavor to glorify God, follow Jesus, serve others, and welcome everyone.

Dear First United Methodist Church Family,

How quickly 2023 is slipping away! Fall ministries are under way, and Advent is on our radar! Back for another round is our Sunday night series, ENGAGE! It was a huge success in the spring, drawing around seventy people each night, and we hope you are attending this fall series. Confirmation Classes have begun with seven students.

Sunday School classes are on the move, literally! Thanks to the hard work of many volunteers, the Wesley Center Sunday School rooms have been cleaned and painted. The Chapel Class, Upper Room Class, and Class Acts are now occupying the back hallway in the Wesley Center. The children's rooms and the nursery have been moved to better accommodate their needs. The Men's Sunday School Class has moved to the second floor of the Wesley Center. And the SAGE, Covenant, and Friendship Classes continue in their usual locations.

Week after week we are seeking to live out our vision to glorify God, follow Jesus, serve others, and welcome everyone. Musical groups, caregiving groups, women's circles, United Methodist Men, Wednesday devotions and Holy Communion, Bible studies, and ministries with children, youth, and older adults are flourishing. This summer saw our Youth Mission Trip to Oklahoma and the seamless transition to a new Youth Director. Together we are helping to fund life-enhancing and life-changing ministries locally and globally, a group of youth use our gym to play basketball weekly, and we are serving our neighbors without housing four days per week through our GAP Ministry. Vibrant worship is happening every Sunday, and we continue to welcome new persons into our church and ministry.

Through the beginning of September, the cost of our ministry exceeds our giving by about \$37,000. Our mortgage balance as of August 30th is \$1,291,149 with a monthly payment of \$17,500. Unfortunately, our rate went from 3.5% to 6.5% in June causing more of our payment to go toward interest. But we are making strides and will continue to do so with your faithful giving.

The GAP Ministry is reaching almost 50 homeless individuals every month with financial assistance, supplies, prayers and encouragement. Our church is living our vision as we seek to glorify God, follow Jesus, serve others, and welcome everyone.





Ministry Moment—KSU Wesley Foundation



The university extended an invitation for the Wesley to collaborate during many of the Freshman Bred Week activities and Welcome Week. God paved the way for numerous opportunities as Pastor Jessica and her team joined hands with the Student Life Office. As the freshmen settled in, Jessica and her team were there, grilling hot dogs as a warm welcome. The ensuing Wednesday, they furnished games and refreshments for the Freshman Yard Party. A week later, information about the Wesley was distributed during the activities fair. Following that, popcorn and snow cones were served for an open-air movie night, and they hosted a "water wars day," complete with a slip 'n slide, dunk tank, and water balloons. The final touch to the welcome week was a heartfelt worship service and barbeque at the university's amphitheater. Here, students came forth to share their insights on flourishing in college, followed by a collective prayer session. One significant highlight was a student who chose to dedicate her life to Jesus, while several others sought prayer. The week concluded with a cozy fireside evening, complete with s'mores, after the inaugural football match. Through these events, many new bonds were formed with students. Their first regular ministry week wrapped up successfully with their signature events - "Sundaze food and worship" and "Thursday Pancakes, Bible, and Jesus (PBandJ)." Several attendees now consider the Wesley as both a spiritual haven and a home.

Pastor Jessica always looks forward to the onset of every semester, cherishing the moments when she can reconnect with students and hear their tales of God's workings in their lives. Just recently, she had a poignant conversation with a student who underwent a challenging summer due to family disputes. This young woman chose to revisit the church, accepting Christ and undergoing baptism. The student was eager to discuss her readings from the Bible with Jessica to make sure that what she heard from God was really God. She shared about how God was speaking to her about Him being her first love and making sure that her fire for him didn't diminish. This student will be sharing her story with the community soon

As the semester is only beginning, Pastor Jessica humbly requests your partnership in prayer. The university has approached them to lead a worship service for the homecoming kick-off. She hopes that this service shines as a beacon to both KSU and its returning alumni. Moreover, there is an upcoming fall retreat at Aldersgate Camp and Retreat Center from Oct 6-8. Prayers are sought for students to deepen their connection with God, for the Holy Spirit to enact life-altering transformations, and for those feeling unloved, anxious, or burdened with academic pressures to find solace and support.
