My Dad

Dear First Friends,

I am unspeakably grateful to you for your many prayers, words, cards, notes, and acts of kindness following the death of my dear dad at the age of 92 on February 24. Our family has been comforted by your prayers and thoughtfulness.

Dad was an outstanding woodworker, craftsman, and fixer. He lived by the motto that a task worth doing is worth doing well. Dad and Mom enjoyed doing seemingly endless projects at home and in their yard and remained in their own home until the ages of 87 and 90.

Dad always planned his work out carefully, and I tend to be that way by nature. He always "measured twice and cut once." If ever a boy could have learned to be handy with tools, I would have learned it from him, but my interests were elsewhere. He tried.

Dad was a hard worker and relaxed by watching TV, movies, and music videos. He was fascinated with technology and enjoyed learning about and using his computer. He enjoyed quoting movie lines, words of wisdom, and the funny things his children and grandchildren said.

Dad was very proud of his family. He taught my sister and me to care for our extended family, to be careful and wise with money, to take good care of what we have, to appreciate a good steak, and to always be honest. He and Mom introduced us to the church and to Christian faith from an early age.

Dad wasn't much of a talker until he retired, at which point he seemed to spend the rest of his life trying to make up for lost time. He was very logical and pragmatic and rarely expressed his emotions until his later years when he became much more inclined to talk about and express his feelings, and even to cry, usually about a song he listened to or his gratitude for his family and friends. On those occasions when he sat in the pew while I was preaching, I often caught a glimpse of him smiling and I knew how proud he was of me.

I will forever be grateful that my dad could live near to us these last few years and that he was deeply loved and well cared for at Dominion Senior Living here in Frankfort. I know that making that last move without Mom took a lot of courage, and he was courageous just like always. In his words, "When I walk into that new place, I'm going to be like, 'Yeah, I'm cool."

I'm glad Dad is no longer struggling. Dementia and physical decline were becoming a heavy burden, even for someone as strong as he was. I'm glad he was my dad. I'm glad for the many times we said, "I love you." I'm glad he's with Mom. I am grateful that God loved him from the very beginning and that we share the hope of resurrection.

As Holy Week and Easter approach, I am also thankful not only that Jesus was raised from the dead but also that he came back to us. I have known his presence especially through your care and kindness over these last few weeks. I also witness the Risen Christ daily through your love for one another, your devotion to God and to FUMC, and the many ways in which you care for others in our community and our world.

I look forward to sharing Holy Week and Easter with you all. There is no way that words can express the tremendous gift of a God who came to where we are, who suffers and dies with and for us, and who keeps coming back to us. There is no greater gift than God's love, our love for one another, and the hope of all things being restored.





Children's Choir Presents "The Singing Bishop" on Palm Sunday



The children's choir will present the brief musical, *The Singing Bishop*, by Hal Hopson on Palm Sunday at GNN and the the 11:00 worship services. It is a hymn interpretation of the Palm Sunday hymn, "All Glory, Laud and Honor." Bishop Theodulph, a great pastor, poet and educator, was imprisoned in Angers, in the District of Orleans, by King Louis I of France. The charge was treason against the crown. According to legend King Louis was leading the Palm Sunday procession through the streets of Angers in 821 when he heard this beautiful singing from the prison tower. The singing was from Theodulph who he had imprisoned. The story goes that the gentle and merciful monarch was so moved with compassion that he pardoned him and sent him back to his church.

The hymn, All Glory, Laud and Honor, has been in our Methodist hymnals since 1849. The words were translated from Bishop Theodulph's writing in the 9th century.

Maundy Thursday Service

The Chancel Choir and guest soloists under the direction of Josh Golden, will present *The Seven Last Words of Christ* by Theodore Dubois on Thursday, March 28, at 7:00 pm. Written in 1867, the oratorio was Dubois' most popular choral piece. The powerful music dramatically depicts the crucifixion of Christ. The agony of this movement contrasts with the more melodic and gentle words to Mary.

Accompanying the choir will be strings, harp, organ, and timpani. You are encouraged to invite friends to join you in this dramatic work for Holy Week.

Cinderella's Closet

FUMC's first Cinderella's Closet was held spring of 2009, in the Averill House. We served approximately 25 girls that year. The program quickly grew, requiring more than 100 volunteers and serving 150-200 girls for a one-day annual event! Over the years, 36 schools, across 19 counties have participated.

Cinderella's Closet has been an engaging ministry of our church. Community volunteers and church members have provided food, on site alterations, one-on-one fairy godmothers, and have prayed in



the chapel during the event. More than a dress, the Cinderella's Closet provides an experience of unconditional love and grace for students. Many of them, having experienced poverty, abuse/neglect, self harm, teen pregnancy, the loss of a parent, are embraced by the volunteers who serve as the body of Christ, creating a memory of "the day I went to a church in Frankfort and got my prom dress"- something that in their future, may draw them back to a church family.

The event is now held at Memorial Baptist Church. After our 2019 event, we moved the dresses to Memorial for storage, (due to the rising costs of storage unit rental). In 2020 the event was not held. In 2021, we donated dresses directly to schools. In 2022, we were unable to move the dresses to FUMC due to the elevator not working at Memorial. The event was held there and with ease, we simply rolled the dresses out for the program and then rolled them back into storage. Out of logistical convenience, but even more so with the opportunity to partner with the community of Christ, we have found a great collaboration with Memorial Baptist Church.

The 2024 event was held March 12 - 16. 184 students from 17 schools participated. Counties included: Anderson, Estill, Bath, Woodford, Wolfe, Franklin, Morgan, Madison, Menifee, Scott, Shelby, and Owen. FUMC women gathered and prepared 200 snack bags and the following beautifully framed poem-

My Princess...

I know you want to be accepted by others...but you were not meant to "fit in". You, MY Princess, were created to stand out. You were created to be mine...to love and be loved...to live the kind of life that leads others to Me.

Remember, it's your choices that will pave your path in life. I will not force you to do anything. I have given you the free will to walk with Me...or to walk away from Me.

I want you to know that you can put on your crown at any time and be the princess you were created to be... to let others know that you belong to Me. If you are ever afraid or hurting, you run to Me and I will protect you and comfort you, My Princess.

You have a royal call on your life. I want you to remember that I love you and will do more in you and through you than you would ever dare to dream.

I love you, My Princess. I love YOU. And you are beautiful.


