

More to Do

Dear First Friends,

We have sung our alleluias for six Sundays now. The Easter season has officially come to a close. We have recalled Jesus' ascension into heaven and his promise to send the waiting disciples power from on high.

Meanwhile, the General Conference of The United Methodist Church (the one that was postponed from 2020, and then postponed again, and then postponed again) finally met in late April and early May in Charlotte, NC. The General Conference, which takes place every four years and is made up of an equal number of ordinary clergy and ordinary laity from around the world, is the only body that can speak or make decisions for the entire United Methodist Church.

Among many decisions made (too many to present in detail here, and frankly I do not know them all!), fifty-year-old language labelling homosexual practice "incompatible with Christian teaching" was removed from *The Book of Discipline*. This change neutralizes our official position and allows for diversity of thought within the same denomination and within individual congregations.

Also removed was language barring "self-avowed practicing homosexuals" from being ordained. Decisions about candidacy for ministry and ordination (now minus prohibitions aimed at one very specific population) will continue to be in the hands of Annual Conference Boards of Ordained Ministry where they have been and where they belong. Similarly, United Methodist churches and clergy are no longer prohibited from holding or performing same-sex marriages (nor are they required to do so). In other words, churches and clergy (minus prohibitions on same-sex marriages) continue to have the authority to decide who they will marry and who will be married in a United Methodist Church facility.

These are changes that many of us here at FUMC celebrate, some will question or feel some uncertainty about, and a few may find discouraging. Let me say that, for this and any other United Methodist Church, far more is the same than has changed. In fact, all of it could fly past you without your even knowing it. What these particular changes do is allow space for people of diverse opinions to continue to belong to the same denomination and the same congregation. For the record, it's been that way for as long as I can remember. What we have done as a denomination is removed harmful language and restrictions aimed at one singled-out segment of our church.

The General Conference also granted Deacons the right to preside over the Sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion in the settings to which they have been appointed; approved a new pension plan for clergy; and forwarded to Annual Conferences for approval a new regionalized structure that would put United Methodists all over the world on equal footing, rather than continuing as a U.S.-centric denomination with non-U.S. Conferences in something of a satellite, or secondary, position. Among other things, the plan would allow the various regions to make *some* adaptations to *The Book of Discipline* to fit their context, which Conferences outside of the United States already have the authority to do. (It is important to note that this *does not* include changing the essence of our doctrines or theology.) Regionalization is an expression of the global nature of our denomination and declares that no one region stands above the others. Implementation of this plan will require approval by a majority of voting members of all United Methodist Annual Conferences together.

Now...if you are still with me, first of all, thank you. Second of all, as an observer during the last four days of General Conference, I want you to know how positive, unified, and encouraging the spirit of General Conference was. There were no demonstrations. No individual or group "did a victory lap" after any of the decisions. The spirit in the room, and throughout the spacious observers' section, was one of respect, love, and joy. Yes, there were differences of opinion expressed.

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No, not all of the more conservative voices were from African countries, and not all of the more progressive voices were from the United States. What I witnessed was one, diverse, truly global church worshiping, making decisions large and small by way of genuine Christian conferencing, and praying in many languages. Oh yes, and under General Conference rules, a request for prayer always takes precedence over any other matter before the body. And it did, every time.

Now, before I finish, let me not allow this recognition of the global church at work to obscure our life together here at FUMC in Frankfort. On Sunday, May 19, seven young people will confirm their faith in Christ and their commitment to Christ through the ministry of FUMC. Tonya and I have delighted in meeting with this Confirmation Class and their Faith Friends since last fall. They are truly great people who are already contributing much to our life as a congregation. We are better and more faithful because of them. As I invited on Sunday, May 12, let us commit to praying for them and for our church after the manner of Ephesians 1:15-23.

And all of this said, this pastor's article isn't finally about General Conference or Confirmation. It's simply one more reminder that we still have work to do, that whatever any of this means to us, God is still calling the church to be the body of Christ in the world. God is still using people like us to lift up Jesus Christ and to participate in God's kingdom work of love, peace, reconciliation, and service here in this world, that we may further the new creation where God's will is done on earth as it is in heaven.

So, in the words of Bishop Will Willimon, words I have been inclined to quote as of late, let us, First United Methodist Church of Frankfort, persist in asking God to reveal to us what portion of Jesus' ministry in this world has been assigned specifically to us. Our mission does not begin or end with us. It begins and ends with what the Holy Spirit assigns us to do.

The season of Easter is officially concluded, but Pentecost is on its way! God is still on the move! (One more) Alleluia!

The Kings Center Update

Every weekday, a yellow school bus pulls up to the Kings Center on the corner of 3rd and Logan Streets, and 20-30 children come pouring out! Most are hungry for a snack and a hug from our director, Deneen Petty. Our after-school program provides a safe place, a healthy snack, homework help, and many enrichment activities. Monthly cards and birthday bags from secret angels encourage our children and help them to feel special.

We have recently hired two part-time people that will help to expand our programing, assist with facility management, and start a database to help meet the individual needs and interests of the children we serve. Here are some comments from our kids when they were interviewed:

1st grader: I have the brain of an elephant—I remember things really fast!

5th grader: *I can speak outside my comfort zone*.

1st grader: I can teach others to make a paper airplane that will really fly!

5th grader: If I had a camera, I would take pictures of people from different cultures doing things together; I like to see people getting along.

Things they'd like to do this summer: camping, swimming, horseback riding,

cooking, fishing, flying a drone, singing, painting, arts & crafts, gymnastics. We are presently looking for volunteers who may want to help with any of these experiences. We would like to create some family-oriented activities like *Bowling* Night or Canoeing on the Elkhorn Creek.

This summer will include weekly trips to the Grand Theatre to enjoy various arts & music programs, weekly trips to the library for our *Book Buddy* program, weekly trips to the KSU/4H program and other fieldtrips to JSP, Farmer's Market, VFW and historical tours of Frankfort. We will celebrate the beginning of summer programming on Friday, June 6, at a Block Party. This will be in connection with *FRESH START*. There will be music by a DJ, games, food, art activities from 5-8 pm.

The Kings Center is free of charge for all children in Frankfort and Franklin County. We thank FUMC for your ongoing support that provides a safe and nurturing environment for our children.

(GAP) Challenges Ahead for those "Living Rough"

Last month, the GAP ministry (God Answers Prayers Through Compassionate People) saw a slight downturn in the number of individuals who sought assistance from our church. However, there's a lot of community consternation over funding issues for the Simon House and the Access Soup Kitchen and Men's Shelter. Both of these critical services are at risk due to loss of funding. Both are still operating this month, but their continued operations are in jeopardy.

Combined with the legislative initiative to criminalize "sleeping rough" and construction anticipated this summer in areas that currently have illegal homeless camps, our GAP ministry is deeply concerned. We continue to offer hope to the homeless through Kroger cards, brown paper bags loaded with a day's worth of food and essential supplies from our Supply Closet. We stand ready to help those who obtain housing with housewares from our Welcome Home room.

The GAP ministry is deeply grateful for the outpouring of kindness and the many donations that our congregation brings to church each week. *Thanks* cannot begin to express the gratitude of those who are struggling today, and need the reassurance and prayers offered by staff directly and by those prayers offered up daily by our church.

Current Needs:

Small Tent that would sleep 2 comfortably (some pup tents are too small except for children) **Brown Paper Bags**: pop tarts, cheese or peanut butter crackers (nabs), chips

Essential Supplies: shampoo, deodorant, small baby powder, small flashlights, toothpaste, feminine pads, shaving cream, sunscreen, small bottles of OTC pain medicine, allergy or cold medicine, antifungal powder/cream, dog food (one of our most requested supplies; we repackage into gallon bags)

Always Welcome: backpacks, duffle bags, reusable water bottles, towels and sheets (clean used linens are fine!). Books of faith or uplifting reading materials are also eagerly sought.
