FUMC Is a Growing Church!

Dear First Friends,

I am happy to say that First United Methodist Church is a growing church! Growth manifests itself in a myriad of ways and can be reflected via numerous metrics. I want to share some of the ways in which we are growing and seeking to grow as a congregation.

First, our worship attendance is rising. At this time last year, the combined average attendance in our two worship services was 167. For this year, our average so far is 185. That is a 10% increase. For reference, our average attendance for all of 2024 was 170.

Currently, I am meeting with six individuals who are interested in learning about church membership and Christian discipleship in the Methodist tradition. Additionally, we are seeing and getting to know a good many new people on Sunday mornings. In fact, we are welcoming new guests almost every week.

To grow in our love for everyone, I need your help. When you see someone you don't know, introduce yourself to them. Be proactive. Don't wait for them to come to you. Don't worry about discovering that you already know them, or should know them, but have forgotten. Don't worry that they've been members for two hundred years and have just returned from a ten-year sabbatical from worship. I often use a simple "trick" when I'm unsure. I approach them with a smile and say, "Help me remember your name/s." If I should remember, they'll nearly always kindly tell me their name/s. If not, they typically respond by saying, "You shouldn't be expected to know our names. We've never been here before." It's virtually foolproof. Bottom line, it doesn't take much to help people feel welcome, but the little it takes depends on you. A smile and a "good morning" are the easiest. If you feel comfortable doing so, strike up a conversation. It doesn't have to be lengthy. Just relax and be yourself. And by the way, you'll be able to tell if they're not especially interested in talking yet. And if they're not, it's probably not your fault, they're just feeling their way.

We have grown our staff recently by welcoming Tori Brown as our Office Administrator. Tori will be working thirty hours per week, but office hours will remain 9 am-3 pm Monday-Thursday. Diana Gregory will be helping Tori get acclimated for a while and finishing up some projects. She will continue producing our monthly newsletter for the foreseeable future. Please know that when these two women are in the office, they are very busy. They, along with our volunteers, are eager to help you during office hours. In return for their helpfulness, please remember that even if someone is at the desk outside of office hours, the office is still closed. Also, even though Tori is a member of our church and we are used to seeing her on Sundays and at other times, she is not perpetually on duty as our Office Administrator. I trust you will kindly understand and keep this in mind.

During the month of September, I strongly encourage you to grow in your listening skills by attending our Holy Listening training at 10:00am on Sundays in Asbury Hall, led by the Rev. Dr. Leanne Hadley. Leanne is a highly skilled teacher of Holy Listening, and you will not want to miss this opportunity to learn from her. I am convinced that to listen is to be a clear representation of Christ in the world. Holy Listening will help all of us to be the hands and feet of Jesus in downtown Frankfort and to strive to love everyone. Holy listening will help us to grow as individuals, to grow God's kingdom, and to cooperate with the Holy Spirit to grow our church.

Finally, during October, we will grow through intentional education about our financial stewardship—what it means to God, what it means to the church, and what it means to each and all of us. Stay tuned for more information about how all of us can deepen our partnership in sustaining our vital, growing ministry.

The Practice of Holy Listening taught by Rev. Dr. Leanne Hadley



Your friends, family and neighbors are invited to join us!



GNN Prayground Update for Fall

Starting on September 7 our activities in the "pray ground" will mirror the main topic of the sermon. Each week the children will have a guiding question and ways to express their answer that follows the main focus of the sermon for the day.

You might not notice much difference because the activities will still be kid-friendly and expressive, but we want to be as intentional as possible to connect what the kids are hearing in the service and what they are doing with their hands.

What is a Prayground?

A space at GNN for children who have a hard time sitting still can be active and moving while they listen and absorb worship.

We also have a nursery available (with a weekly lesson) for infants and toddlers if you need. But, please know that children of all ages are welcome in our worship services and are never expected to leave!




Kids Caring About GAP! NEW Weekly Offering in Sunday School.

Secret Angels Needed for Kings Center Children



The mission of the City of Angels Program is to make a positive difference in the lives of the children and youth in Frankfort who attend activities at the Kings Center. A oneon-one relationship is developed between a sponsor (either an individual or a group such as a Sunday school class, a church circle, a club, etc.) and a child. The anonymous sponsor, known as a Secret Angel, provides emotional support through monthly correspondence, gifts on special occasions, and spiritual support in the form of daily prayer for the child and his/her family. A person may also participate as a donor. The concept is simple: Helping children know that the community loves them.

Angel Responsibilities

- Pray each day for the sponsored child:
- Send one card/letter a month to encourage the child;
- Donate \$ 100 yearly toward expenses such as food/snacks, field trips, school supplies and other activities;
- Provide Christmas gifts from a wish list;
- Recognize the child on his/her birthday with a card.

Roger is working two jobs and although still homeless, he acquired a gym membership so he can take regular showers. He expressed his thankfulness for the opportunity of a new beginning. We are blessed to be a blessing in this church!

This lodge was truly the heartbeat of the camp—serving as the dining hall, office, and summer staff housing. Its absence is deeply felt by all who have experienced the warmth and ministry of Aldersgate.

For years, the camp has been working toward building a new lodge. Even with the insurance settlement, the Bishop has announced that an additional \$1.5 million is needed to bring this vision to life. Plans are underway for a portable kitchen so that retreats and camps can continue.
